







DEEP INTEREST STRUCTURE


- Each of us has a unique pattern of interests, a "potential self" that seeks expression.






















Alice Walker Case Study

- · Author, poet, activist for social justice.
- First African American woman to win the Pulitzer Prize for her novel, The Color Purple.
- Born into a sharecropper family, last of 8 children, in Georgia during Jim Crow
- Social activist in the 1960s who risked expulsion from Spelman College due to her civil rights activism. Graduated from Sarah Lawrence College in 1966.
- Married a Caucasian, Jewish man during this period, with disapproval from family and community. Life threats from the KKK.






Alice Walker Case Study


- <u>The Color Purple</u>, though well received by critics and media, was vehemently criticized by some in her own African American community, including threats made to her life.
- Her creative works of poetry, essays and fiction continued through the years as did her activism, receiving both acclaim and criticism throughout
- Alice Walker has said, in Beauty in Truth, "creation is really a sustained period of bliss, even though the subject can still be very sad, because there is the triumph of coming through, an understanding that you have, that you did it the way only you can do it, you didn't do it the way someone told you to do it... that is what makes us, us."





















































"Our deepest fear is not that we are inadequate. Our deepest fear is that we are powerful beyond measure.
